East Whitlawburn Regeneration Update

South Lanarkshire Council's contractor has been on site since March 2019 stripping empty properties of non-structural elements such as windows, cladding and internal fixtures and fittings in preparation for demolition.

The first phase of full demolitions commenced in June 2019. SLC has issued assurances that everything will be done to keep disruption to residents to a minimum while the demolitions are being carried out.


Whitlawburn Community Resource Centre Refurbishment Work



Tenancy Services Report

April 2018 to March 2019



Turnover and Allocations

At March 2019 we had 88 applications and 121 on our transfer list. The average time to re-let properties was 26 days which is above our target of 21 days. Several properties were returned to us needing extensive work and this extended the re-let time. We also held some properties at the year end and we are now working to reduce this re-let time back to within target. The number of lets for 2018/19 was 77. Of these 43% were direct applications, 16% were transfers and 42% were South Lanarkshire Council referrals.

Rent Collection and Arrears

Current tenant arrears were sitting at 4.62% for 2018/19 and former tenants were 4.63%. During the full year we collected 97.8% of rent due.



Estate Management

Housing Management and concierge staff work closely with other agencies to resolve neighbour and estate difficulties as quickly as possible.

Concierge staff also manage the housing alarm service and respond to calls through the system. All officers are first aid trained.

There were 9 abandoned tenancies, 5 cases of anti-social behaviour issues, 282 Estate Management issues, 83 concierge incident reports and 152 housing alarm calls- 5 of these calls required emergency action.

WWHC – Charitable Giving (April – June 2019)

Every year the Management Committee have a small budget to support local, national and international charities that it sees fit.

From April to June the Committee had only one request for a donation. Management Committee awarded the charity Children with Cancer £50.

Best Start Grant

The Best Start Grant is a new Scottish benefit to help parents and carers on low incomes with the costs of looking after children. It is a package of three different payments, which can be applied for as a child gets older.

Three different payments are as follows:

The Pregnancy and Baby Payment - a one off payment of £600 for a first child or £300 for a second or subsequent child. It is to help with the costs of pregnancy or having a baby such as maternity clothes, a cot or a pram

The Early Learning Payment - a one off payment of £250 to help with the costs of having a pre-school child for example the costs of day trips, books or toys for home learning



The School Age Payment – a one off payment of £250 to help with the costs of having a child of school starting age, such as the costs of a new school bag, to pay for school trips or after school activities.



You can apply for all three payments now either online at mygov.uk, calling 0800 182 2222 or by post. Whether the child is eligible depends on their date of birth.

The three payments are grants not loans, so you don't have to repay them and it won't affect any other benefits or tax credits that you get. Please contact your Housing Officer for further information.

- Keep doors closed to prevent smoke from filling your house
- Dial 999 and ask for Fire and Rescue Service, giving as much information as you can.

Please be a responsible owner and clean up after your dog!

Residents have complained about dog fouling on the estate and our Ground Maintenance contractor is experiencing difficulties in cutting some of the grassed areas, particularly within communal and individual gardens. It is an offence not to pick up after your dog. <u>Free dog poop bags</u> are available from the Main Office and Concierge. Thank you to all the owners that do clean up after their pets.



Drivers please reduce your speed when driving through the estate. Thank you.

Traffic calming measures are in place to help slow traffic down at Morven Road, Iona Place, Tiree Way, Jura Terrace and at the Low Rise Terraces/Belmont Road which also serves as access to the towers.

Children remember the Safe Cross Code

Stop at the kerb and look for a safe place to cross, don't hurry, stop and wait **Look** all around and **Listen** before you cross the road, let all the traffic pass then walk straight across, keep watching that's the **Safe Cross Code**!

Blockages to Multi Storey and Low Rise Refuse Chutes "Please Don't Cram Rubbish In"

The chutes are designed for disposal of small refuse bags - when disposing of rubbish please consider if it will fit down the chute.

If it is too big to fit in the hopper 'please do not force it' as this could lead to a blockage in the chute and possible damage to the hopper.

When a blockage occurs Concierge staff

spend time trying to unblock it. If they are unable to remove the blockage a contractor is then instructed to carry out the work - the cost of which comes out of rental income.



No Smoking within MSF's, Lifts and Indoor Common Areas



When neighbours, visitors, friends and family breathe in second hand smoke – it is not just unpleasant for them, it can damage their health too.

Passive smoking is especially harmful for children as they have less well-developed airways, lungs and immune systems. Smoking within communal areas has also been raised in our recent fire risk assessment as cigarette ends have been found in communal areas which could be a potential fire risk.
